





First Edition of the first work (reprinted 1677). A delightful book, essentially selections from the second part of Eustache de Refuge's, "Traicté de la Cour." Page 17 references tennis volleying, "... we ought to do as they who play at Tennis, who regard not onely [sic] to toss back the ball dextrously, but also to do it so that they may be ready to receive it in place, from whence they may return it where it may be most advvantageous for the game."





ERUTE IN FICTION.

ESTC calls for an extra prelim, not present here, which is described thus, "Title page on leaf A2 repeated on leaf A7." Our title appears to be a cancel, so perhaps a variant appeared between the first issue of 1673, and the reprint (with less prelims) of 1677.

The **Starkey catalogue** is not called for, and rates a separate entry in ESTC: R226391. It is rare, with copies located at Durham, Longleat, National Trust, and Folger. The date is given as 1671, presumably taken from the announcment of what's in the press, on page 11, i.e. "10th April, 1671."

ESTC: T11 15596, for the prospectus leaf, gives locations at [GB] BL, Derry & Raphoe Diocesan Library, O (Bodleian), [Europe] Niedersachsische Staats-und Universitatsbiliothek, Statsbibliothek Berlin, [N. America] Folger, and Smith College. The prospectus leaf is listed twice in Henrey:

1) the proposal / advertising leaf, as Henrey 1223 "Plants already engraved in Mr Petiver's English Herbal. London, Mr. Christopher Bateman, [1713?]," where it is noted as: "containing a list of the figures of the first ten plates only of Petiver's Catalogue of Mr Ray's English Herbal. It was also printed in p. 4 of the sixth decade of Petiver's Gazophylacium."

2) under Henrey 1210. "Hebarij britannici . . . Raij catalogus cum iconibus, etc. (A Catalogue of Mr Ray's English herbal, etc.), London, 1713" The note tells us that "The above work was issued in two parts consisting of plates 1-10 and plates 1-50 respectively. In the Bodleian Library Oxford (Vet. A4.c.196) are preserved copies of these two parts in their



original grey paper wrappers. These are undated. The first part consists of plates 1-10 together with the printed leaf headed 'Plants already engraved in Mr Petiver's English herbal,' . . ."

Our item, then, is the first of the original parts issue. Henrey 1211 details the further history of this title, its reprinting, in part, under the supervision of Sir Hans Sloane in 1732: "... very few copies...," etc.

With regard to the dedication slip on the first plate of our copy, similar ones, but this time to the Duchess of Beaufort and Dr. Patrick Blair, are reproduced in Henrey, Vo.2, pp. 83 & 85, showing the same lettering and positioning with respect to the plate as ours. Patrons payed extra for the privelege.

This copy, with the owner name J.P.Ord inked on the cover, is **priced, and the buyers' names** all given. A rare catalogue, 2 copies on COPAC, both at the V&A. Worldcat adds the Grolier, Harvard, Williams College, Newberry, Brown, & University of Virginia. Bernal (1784-1854) collected widely (and expensively), his other collections were dispersed in two other sales the same year: Works of Art & Vertu, Byzantine to Louis XVIth at Christies; and Prints, at Sotheby's.

Holdings of this, the catalogue for the third and concluding part of the sale, are quite meagre. Not found in COPAC, which locates a single copy at the V&A of the "First Portion" which ran from 13th to 17th December 1915. Worldcat adds (all 3 parts of the sale) Harvard, Bibliotheque Nationale, University of Regina; with the Metroplitan (Watson), Yale (Sterling), Northwestern, & the Université de Caen holding the Third Part only.

An extraordinary assemblage. In this portion, we have, for example, an ALS from Horace Walpole, 1 p., Nov. 9th 1776, from Strawberry Hill, to James Bindley, the collector, referring to objects of art in which both were interested, sold for £5 to James. The **Shakespeare Fourth Folio** (with facsimile title and dedication fetched £9.15 shillings (Quaritch); 6 vols of Rowlandson prints, £740 (Maggs). Fifteen letters from Coleridge to John Rickman, 1772-1834, £35 (Thomson).

First Edition (simultaneously published in Dublin), of a work discussed in detail in: An Irish Picaresque Novel: William Chaigneau's "The History of Jack Connor," by Ian Campbell Ross in "Studies: An Irish Quarterly Revien," Vol. 71, No. 283 (Autumn, 1982), pp. 270-279. Ross describes the novel as authentically Irish, within the European tradition of the Picaresque, and one of the best 18th century Irish novels. The name change in the title is explained in the text: banished to England (from Ireland), following an amorous affair, the protagonist changes his Irish name and accent to prevent ridicule by the "Ignorant and Vulgar." The action moves from London to Paris (before a happy return to Ireland), allowing the hero to contrast the vicissitudes of both cities.

Chaigneau (1701-1781), of Huguenot descent, had served in the military in Flanders and elsewhere, and despite the popularity of his novel (regarded as disreputable in

certain quarters), gained little from it financially.

ESTC locates 3 copies: Huntington, Rothamsted, and Bavaria State Library. Shaw (1608-1672) pamphleteer on agriculture and husbandry, with land reclamation and soil improvement as his abiding themes. In this pamphlet, he notes the richness of river pastures prone to periodic flooding, but also the damage caused by unmanaged floods. He suggests as a remedy that landowners should embank their land to retain and manage flood waters, thus enriching their soil (with nutrients unable to be washed out) and solving the problem of damaging floods, at a stroke.



Hills, who had died in 1712, no doubt left a large quantity of his piracies behind him, and a proportion were aquired and bound up by Warner in two volumes with fresh title-pages (which presumably enabled him to steer them round the revived Licensing Act). Apparently no two volumes were the same in composition. The title-page of our volume does not specify whether it was the first or second volume, but the spine is gilt-lettered "vol.1". The two volume collection, or indeed either of the volumes, is extremely rare. No doubt later booksellers disbound the majority of them, since each piece has separate title, register, and pagination.

Swiss-born Berthoud (1727-1807) spent most of his working life as an horologist in Paris, at a time of great innovation and competition (for example, with Pierre Le Roy). Colonel Sir Ralph Sneyd, Royalist M.P., died (from a bullet wound) in combat on the Isle of Man, in 1650. His principal residence, **Keele Hall**, was already badly damaged and his finances in disarray from fines to the tune of £20,000. His widow Jane (née Downes) is known to have died in 1670, which accords with the date of this document. Broadwall, as it is called here, properly refers to Bradwell or Broadwall [Hall], Staffordshire. The Sneyds were major Staffordshire landowners, accruing substantial estates in the 16th century, including the Keele estate, (later to become Keele University). The Sneyds varied their primary residence, but Broadwall was one such, and in light of the damage done at Keele and the apparent residence of Sir Ralph's widow, it is fair to suggest that Broadwall was the primary residence at the time of our document. Revival of the family fortunes, by Ralph's brother William, was slow.

The present Inventory, quite densely written over the course of some 214 lines, gives us a wonderful and intimate insight into the contents and furnishings of an ancient family hall at that time. Furniture and furnishings (carpets, curtains, cushions and pillows, etc.) are mostly noted by location. Smaller goods and chattels are grouped in categories, for example: Arms and armour, including: "2 swords, a case of pistolls, a carbine . . . a small Gunne . . . [£] 2. [s] 10. [d.] -." Metalware is divided up into plate

(i.e. silver), pewter, brass, and iron ware. The end of the inventory details livestock, corn in the barn and awaiting harvest in the fields ("three dayes worke,"). A document such as this allows us to contrast the assigned values of different classes of goods, so that "one Barren Cow" is valued at £2.16.00, compared to "a larg gde bible & 28 bookes" at £1.10.0.



A somewhat distressed copy of the **First English Edition**, and in need of a rebind. In 1702 Whiston, a Fellow of Clare College, was chosen by Newton to succeed him as Lucasian Professor of Mathematics; in 1707 he was appointed Boyle lecturer. In 1710 Whiston was expelled from the University, having found himself in hot water over his religious unorthodoxy (Arianism). Whiston is also remembered for his work on longitude and comets.

The volumes together provide an interesting study in the **evolution of a book**. Apart from the title pages [see illustration], many of the woodcut headpieces and historiated initials differ, especially between the 1623 and 1640 (1650) editions. In the latter, noticeably more neo-pagan iconography has crept in, and the overall printing quality and feel of the work denotes the muddled state, perhaps, of the English psyche at the time (English Civil War).



The text itself is now, undeservedly, much neglected. Along with the Bible, Prayer Book, and Foxe's Book of Martyrs, it once adorned every church and chapel in the land. The sermons and homilies, in essence, delineate the concerns, civil and religious, of the day. Fulminations against whoredom, drunkeness, swearing, idleness, gluttony, idolatry, and disobedience, sit side by side with promotions of thankfulness, fasting, alms giving, etc.

Mostly found bound up with Bibles, and an important adjunct to it, this early issue is quite well represented in institutions in the UK, and at the Folger, Huntington, and University of Illinois libraries in America.

Speed (1542-1629) worked as a tailor until he was 50. Thereafter, his fascination for and knowledge of history drew him into the orbit of the learned, and he became a member of the Society of Antiquaries. He is primarily remembered today as a mapmaker.

The Genealogies appeared to coincide with the publication of the King James Bible, in 1611, all copies of which, for the first ten years or so, were issued with the Genealogies, under Royal License granted to Speed. The map of Canaan was based on an earlier work by John More, Fellow of Christ's College, Cambridge, which, on his death in 1592, Speed took over. The map first appeared in a form (now lost) in 1595.



With the death of Lord Wraxall in 2001, the scramble to save the extraordinary house and collections at Tyntesfield, the seat of the Gibbs family, began. A sale of the contents was scheduled by Christie's for 2002, but was averted. A

few low key dispersals of what was considered unimportant or redundant, did in fact take place, and the present books are from one such cache.




However, perhaps the most interest rests with the bindings, slightly varied but with no two actually identical, although consistent in their overall design, and of uniform colour. The last volume contains the **oval printed ticket of "Henry Baynes & Son**, Clements Lane, City. Stationers, Account Book Manufacturers, Engravers and Printers." The actual printing was undertaken by different firms, beginning with William Wilcockson and ending with William Clowes, all operating to the same format.

A pleasingly clean and bright copy. First published in 1678. **Of this edition we can find only two copies** via the 'European Library' catalogue: at the Bibliotheque Nationale of France, and the Austrian National Library.

A landmark in the history of the development of the novel, utilising an accurate historical setting over the course of the year 1558-1559, and placing in it the heroine, around whom the novel revolves. For the first time, psychological analysis is directly employed, taking the reader into the introspective world of the protagonist, etc.

The book was an instant and huge success, and has remained central in the affections of the French people and culture ever since. In 2006, prior to his term as President, Nicolas Sarkozy caused a storm by his negative remarks about the book, when he ridiculed the fact that, beyond three hundred years after its first publication, questions about 'La Princesse de Cleves' were still included in the civil service entrance exams. Storms of protests followed, with the novel at the focus of university campaigns to stem the encroachment of big business interests and values into university life, the dumbing down of French culture, etc.. Public readings were performed all over France, and the novel surged to a new level of popularity. The work has therefore come to represent more than simply just a book, but a cultural rallying point.

The first English edition appeared in London in 1679, and similarly met with huge interest. Its influence, even decades later, for example on Richarson's 'Pamela,' is well attested. Even in the 21st century, it is still being made into films and plays, both here and abroad.
